Sisters and Brothers,

On the Inside out-of-work list we have 17 on Book 1, 24 on Book 2, 11 on Book 3, and 2 on Book 4. There are 2 on Book 3 for Sound & Comm. There are 11 on CW Book 1 and 231 on CW Book 2. There are 3 Inside apprentices on the out-ofwork list.

I have proposed some Bylaws changes for Local 234 (in bold italics). The proposed changes were read at the October general membership meeting and will be discussed and voted on at the November general Made per the NEBF Par Related Organizations. membership meeting. The changes will bring our Bylaws in-line with current policy and make things more transparent for audit purposes. The 401(k) was started earlier this year for Local 234 staff. The proposal to match is new.

ARTICLE V, Sec. 4 All applicants shall be required to pass a written examination the **Ninth District Standardized Evaluation** covering their classification.

ARTICLE VII, Sec. 5 The Business Manager Financial Secretary and Assistant Business Manager(s)/Organizer shall receive all of the fringes (*except LMCC and AMF*) based on the number of hours that their salary is computed per week as negotiated in the Inside Wireman's Agreement.

Sec. 6 (a) * Wages shall include the full fringe package (except LMCC and AMF).

Sec. 7. Wages of non-member all employees, **except otherwise stated herein**, shall be determined by the Executive Board of the Local Union and shall be approved by the Local Union.

(a) Pension contributions for all employees, except the Business Manager-Financial Secretary and the Assistant Business Manager(s)/Organizer(s), shall be based on 25% of W-2 compensation per the Special Agreement with I.B.E.W. District No. 9 Pension Plan.

(c) NEBF contributions for all employees shall be I have proposed some Bylaws changes for Local 234 (in bold Related Organizations.

> (d) All employees shall be eligible to participate in the IBEW Employees 401(k) Plan ("401(k) Plan"). All employees may allocate 1% to 100% of their base pay through the 401(k) Plan on a pre-tax basis, subject to IRS and 401(k) Plan limitations. The Local Union shall match 100% up to 5% of the pre-tax amount that is contributed by the employee to the 401(k) Plan.

> ARTICLE XVI, Sec. 2 (b) Changes shall be introduced at one Local Union meeting and acted upon at a second Local Union meeting. The proposal cannot be acted on at the time it was proposed. A written notice specifically stating the proposed assessments or changes in admission fees or dies **dues** shall be mailed to each member in good standing at the member's last-known home address at least twenty (20) days prior to the Local Union meeting at which the membership is to vote on the question.

> Sunday, November 11th is **Veteran's Day**. **Monday**, **November 12th** is the day that Veteran's Day is observed and is a Holiday for the Inside and CECWs, not for Sound & Communications. **Thursday, November 22nd and Friday the 23rd** are Holidays for the Inside, Sound & Communications, and CECWs.

Ballot Initiative Positions

Proposition 1 (Veterans & Affordable Housing Bond Act of 2018)

Authorizes \$4 billion in bonds to fund specified housing assistance programs.

SUPPORT (vetsandaffordablehousingact.org)

Proposition 2 (No Place Like Home Act of 2018)

Authorizes bonds to fund existing housing program for individuals with mental illness. **SUPPORT**

Proposition 3 (Water Supply and Water Quality Act of 2018)

Authorizes \$8.9 billion in bonds to fund water supply and quality projects, watershed, fish, wildlife, water conveyance, and groundwater sustainability and storage. **SUPPORT** (waterbond.org)

Proposition 4 (Children's Hospital Bond Act of 2018)

Authorizes \$1.5 billion in bond funds for the construction, expansion, renovation, and equipping of certain hospitals that treat children. **SUPPORT** (yesonproposition4.org)

Proposition 5 (People's Initiative to Protect Prop 13 Savings)

Changes requirements for certain property owners to transfer their property tax base to replacement property. **OPPOSE**

Proposition 6 (Repeal of SB 1 Transportation Revenues)

Eliminates road repair and transportation funding. Requires fuel taxes and vehicle fees to be approved by voters. **OPPOSE** (noprop6.com)

Proposition 7 (Daylight Savings Time)

The Legislature, with a 2/3 vote, could change daylight saving time if the change is allowed by the federal government. Absent any Legislative change, California would maintain its current daylight saving time period (early March to early November). **OPPOSE**

Proposition 8 (Fair Pricing for Dialysis Act)

Kidney dialysis clinics would have their revenues limited by a formula and could be required to pay rebates to certain parties (primarily health insurance companies) that pay for dialysis treatment.

SUPPORT (yeson8.com)

Proposition 9 (Three Californias)

Splits state into three different states: North, South and LA. (Removed from ballot by court order.) **OPPOSE**

Proposition 10 (Repeal of Costa Hawkins)

Expands local governments' authority to enact rent control on residential property. **OPPOSE** (noprop10.org)

Proposition 11 (Rest Period Takeaway)

Requires private sector emergency ambulance employees to remain "on-call" during work breaks and eliminates employer liability. **OPPOSE**

Proposition 12 (Prevention of Cruelty to Farm Animals Act)

Establishes new requirements on farmers to provide more space for egg-laying hens, breeding pigs, and calves raised for veal. California businesses would be banned from selling eggs or uncooked pork or veal that came from animals housed out of compliance. **NEUTRAL**

Brother **Norman Wiedemann** passed on September 25th. Brother Wiedemann was a 57year member.


S&C Wage Increase

Sound & Communications members had a wage allocation meeting on **Saturday, October 27th**. The S&C Agreement has a raise effective December 1, 2018 of \$3.00. The membership present voted to put \$0.50 to Heath & Welfare, \$0.50 to retirement, and \$2.00 to wages. Because of the requested \$0.50 towards H&W, the monthly hours for eligibility will decrease from 135 down to 132. The current Agreement is effective December 1, 2017 to November 30, 2019.

Inside Health & Welfare Plan

The Inside Health & Welfare Plan is doing very well. The current months of reserves are at 18.7. That's great news and possibly the healthiest this plan has ever been. At the September meeting of Health & Welfare the Trustees voted to increase your hour bank from 6 months to 7 months or 840 hours. The Trustees also took action to reduce the non-bargaining, active self-pay, and COBRA rates. This means that if you lose health coverage by running out of your hour bank, you can self-pay for three months at \$622. The next three months are at \$1,244. After that COBRA is either \$1,151 for medical and Rx or \$1,252 for medical, dental, vision, and Rx.
