

THE HEALTH CORNER

SLEEP APNEA: WHAT IS IT AND ARE YOU AT RISK?

Sleep apnea is a common condition in which your breathing stops and restarts many times while you sleep. This can prevent your body from getting enough oxygen. Sleep apnea creates insufficient sleep which has been linked to the development of a number of health complications and chronic diseases:

SLEEP APNEA COMPLICATIONS:

Increase risk of vehicle or workplace accidents due to daytime fatigue Cardiovascular disease: High blood pressure or heart problems. Type 2 diabetes: Higher risk of insulin resistance Depression Obesity

WHAT ARE THE SYMPTOMS OF SLEEP APNEA?

- Snoring
- Breathing that starts and stops during sleep
- Waking up suddenly after gasping or choking
- Fatigue or sleepiness during the day
- Restlessness while sleeping, or regular nighttime awakenings
- Dry mouth or sore throat when you wake up
- Trouble concentrating, forgetfulness, or crankiness
- Depression or anxiety
- Constant need to go pee at night
- Night sweats

How Doctors Diagnose Sleep Apnea

 Medical history Physical exam

Sleep Studies: Your doctor may refer you to a sleep specialist or a center for a sleep study.

SLEEP APNEA HOME REMEDIES

- **Lose weight:** About half of people with sleep apnea are overweight
- **Don't use alcohol and sleeping pills:** They decrease the muscle tone in the back of your throat
- Change sleep positions: You may breathe more easily if you stay off your back
- Stop smoking: Smoking increases swelling in the upper airway, making snoring and apnea worse **Treat allergies.** Nasal allergies swell tissues in your airways making it harder to breathe

Sleep Apnea Medical Treatments

Continuous positive airway pressure (CPAP) machine: You wear a mask over your nose or mouth while you sleep. The mask is hooked up to a machine that delivers air flow into your nose

Automatic positive airway pressure (APAP): CPAP machine does not helpful

ORAL APPLIANCES: DENTAL DEVICES CAN HELP KEEP YOUR AIRWAY OPEN WHILE YOU SLEEP

Make an appt with your doctor if you are experiencing symptoms of sleep apnea. Please reach out to me for any questions or assistance you may need.


