The Health Corner

It is Tick Season- Be aware and prevent Tick bites.

Tick exposure can occur year-round, but ticks are most active during warmer months (April-September)

Tick bites can cause Lymes Disease.

Ticks live in grassy, brushy, or wooded areas, and on animals. Spending time outside walking your dog, camping, gardening, working, or hiking may bring you in contact with ticks.

To Prevent Tick bites:

Avoid wooded and brushy areas with tall grass and leaf litter.

Walk in the center of trails.

Check your body for ticks after being outdoors: In and around the hair, ears, under arms,

waist/belly button, back of knees, and between legs.

Treat clothing and gear with products containing 0.5% permethrin. You can also buy permethrin-treated clothing and gear.

Check your clothing for ticks. Ticks may be carried into the house on clothing.

Check gear and pets for ticks. Ticks can be carried into the home on pets and gear, then attached to a person later, so carefully examine pets, coats, and daypacks.

Shower soon after being outdoors.

What to do if you get a Tick bite:

Remove the tick as soon as possible.

Stay Ahead with Your Electrician State Certification

We would like to bring to your immediate attention an important matter regarding the renewal and initial requests for Electrician State Certification in California. The Department of Industrial Relations (DIR) is currently experiencing a significant backlog in processing these requests. We understand the potential impact this may have on your professional status and are actively addressing the issue with the DIR.

In response to our communications, the DIR has acknowledged the delays and informed us that they are increasing their staffing levels in an effort to expedite the process. While we are hopeful that these measures will resolve the backlog soon, it is crucial for each of you to take proactive steps to avoid any disruption in your certification status.

Plan Ahead: Do not wait until the last minute. Check the expiration date of your current certification and start the renewal process well in advance.

Prepare Your Documents: Ensure that all required documents are complete and ready for submission. This preparation can significantly reduce the chance of delays.

Submit Early: Given the current backlog, we strongly advise submitting your renewal or application as early as possible.

Stay Updated: Keep an eye on communications from the DIR for any updates regarding the processing times and any further instructions.


